PENNSYLVANIA MIGRATION COUNT BY BRUCE CARL

The 2013 PAMC was held on Saturday, May 11, 2013 and was the 18th consecutive year that Lancaster County participated in this annual event. It was another very successful day with a total of 36 volunteers, birding various locations across the county, identifying 168 species. This count also included all three of the Lancaster County Bird Club's (LCBC) warbler walk locations. Some of the species highlights include 11 raptors, 12 shorebirds, 6 swallows, 31 warblers and 9 sparrows. Individual highlights for the day included the following: 1 Trumpeter Swan, 1 Lapland Longspur, 1 American Avocet, 1 White-rumped Sandpiper, 1 Wilson's Snipe, 1 Blue-headed Vireo, 2 Common Ravens, 2 Brown Creepers, 2 Vesper Sparrows, 1 White-crowned Sparrow and 3 Purple Finch.

Again a big Thank You to all who volunteered their time for the day or part of the day. Your time helping with this count is very much appreciated and the birds identified are a direct result of your efforts!

CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT OVERVIEW 2013

As reported by Nick Bolgiano in the July 2014 issue of "Pennsylvania Birds," Southern Lancaster County led all counts with 102 species reported, Western Chester County was second with 98 and Southern Bucks County was third with 97. The Lititz count ranked 10th with 86 species identified and the Lancaster Count ranked 11th with 85 species. The 2013 count was notable for the irruption of Snowy Owls. All three Lancaster County CBCs recorded a Snowy Owl.

SOUTHERN LANCASTER COUNTY CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT BY BOB SCHUTSKY

The weather began to get a bit nasty on Saturday, the day before the coint, in the late afternoon. It began with 2-4 inches of snow, followed by sleet, and a heavy coating of freezing rain. By 9 PM Saturday night the local road conditions were not good at all. Conditions were even worse at 5:30 AM Sunday morning, the day of the count. There was LOTS of ice, and deep water puddles on the road. Driving was bad, walking was worse. Many people began the count a few hours late, and several waited until noon. There were about 10 people who stayed home because of bad roads and did not participate in the count. We had 44 participants this year. We often have 50-60, or even more.

The weather grew steadily nicer on Sunday morning, actually quite nice. There was no precipitation or fog, a light NW breeze, increasing sunshine, and temperatures of 40-45 F. It was excellent birding weather, IF people could get out of their driveway and reach the area that they intended to bird.

In 2011 and 2012, our cumulative total number of species had been holding at 174 species, all of the species that have been tallied since we began the count in 1976. It is very difficult to add a new species after so much

intensive birding for so many years. But we managed to add one species this year, and a very impressive bird it was. A SNOWY OWL was found in a large agricultural area about 3.5 miles SE of Quarryville. It was a spectacular find from the back seat of a moving vehicle, perched not at all close to the road. The Snowy Owl was seen by many people on the day of the count, and many more people on the days to follow. It came in the winter of a massive irruption into much of the US, especially in the eastern portions of the country, plus eastern Canada. Simply put, it was spectacular! We have now seen eight species of owls in the history of the Solanco CBC.

A lot of the numbers of each species that were found were down this year, almost definitely because of the fewer people that participated in the count due to road conditions, and fewer hours spent birding. But the overall species count this year was 102, compared to an average of 104 of the past ten years. The total number of individual birds tallied this year was very low at 23,877 compared to the most recent 10-year average of 208,897. This year's low count of individuals was mostly a result of the low numbers of blackbirds, which sometimes number in the hundreds of thousands, and occasionally more than a million. The flocks simply were not in the count circle this year.

Here are a few trends, comparing this year's count to the numbers seen between 2003 and 2012 (10-year average). A Mallard count of 162 was low compared to 500 to 1000 typically seen. A Redhead and four Long-tailed Ducks during count week were good finds. There were 13 Ring-necked Pheasants, much more than in any of the past ten recent years. Are these stocked birds, or are they actually reproducing? Most likely, no one truly knows for certain. Wild Turkey numbers continue to grow with 37 this year. The highest count ever was 47 in 2011. A great find was a Golden Eagle, the third in the history of the count. American Kestrel numbers continue low, and no merlins or peregrines were observed for the first time since 2006.

Ring-billed, Herring, and Great Black-backed Gull numbers were all low, with no rare or unusual gulls found all day. The origin of four Ringed Turtle-Doves seen near Quarryville was a total mystery. They were not added to the count, but were considered escapees. A Red-headed Woodpecker was the first seen since 2004. 1721 Horned Larks was the highest total in the past ten years. Red-breasted Nuthatches were almost non-existent compared to 48 in 2012 and 118 in 2005, the highest count ever. There were two Palm Warblers, for the second year in a row. There was a ridiculously low count of 429 individual birds of all of the blackbird species combined. A count such as that is totally unheard of!

Thanks to all who braved the driving conditions to participate in the count. Many folks gathered at our house after the count to tally the day's findings and partake of a fine dinner. Thanks to my wife Nancy for preparing such wonderful dishes. The next count is scheduled for Sunday, 14 December 2014. Please join us, and bring a friend.

LITITZ CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT BY BRUCE CARL

The Lititz CBC was held on Sunday, December 29, 2013 on a rather cool/cold, damp and very rainy day. A total of 38 participants identified 86 species for the day which is pretty good considering the weather conditions. The highlight for the day was a Snowy Owl found and photographed by Pam Fisher near the intersection of Wissler and Clay roads just outside of Ephrata. This a first for the Lititz Christmas Bird Count. Some other nice discoveries for the day included 2 Killdeer, 1 Wilson's Snipe, 1 Barn Owl, 1 Barred Owl, 1 Gray Catbird, 2 Yellow-rumped Warblers, 1 Chipping Sparrow and 1 Purple Finch. Count week species were Peregrine Falcon and Brown Thrasher.

LANCASTER CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT BY BARBARA HUNSBERGER

The Lancaster CBC was held on Saturday, January 4, 2014, the last day of the 2013 Christmas Bird Count period. There were four to six inches of snow on the ground and freezing rain the night before, made for treacherous driving and walking. Most participants started later in the morning after the rain had stopped but cut the day short when light freezing rain began again in the afternoon. Some of the areas that were normally covered were inaccessible due to a coating of ice on the snow, ex. Lake Grubb trail. As a result, the total number of species identified was 85 for the 2013 count, compared to 105 for the 2012 count. Highlights of the day included: 1 Red-breasted Merganser, 2 Red-shouldered Hawks, four owl species - including a Snowy Owl during count week, 1 Peregrine Falcon, 1 Brown Thrasher, 1 Palm Warbler, and 1 Gray Catbird. There were no large flocks of blackbirds anywhere to be found which was unusual for this time of year. Many thanks to the volunteers who braved the adverse weather conditions.

LANCASTER COUNTY YEAR LIST BY MIKE EPLER

During 2013, birders in Lancaster County reported locating 258 species of birds. This is below the 5-year average of 271 and the 10-year average of 275 species. One new species was added to the official total species list of Lancaster County, bringing it to 353.*

There were 32 species of waterfowl reported. Brant was not seen in the county for the first time in 14 years. Black Scoter also ended a 7-year run. Notable finds were: Black-bellied Whistling-Duck, seen for the fourth time in 37 years, and Trumpeter Swan, seen for the ninth time during the same time period.

Game birds were a mixed bag. While Wild Turkeys were seen in good numbers, Northern Bobwhite was not seen for the first time in 37 years and Ruffed Grouse was missed for the fourth time in the last five years after a 32-year run.

Loons and grebes were well represented with just Eared Grebe missing from the list. A Pacific Loon was seen in late April on the Susquehanna River near Marietta. This is just the third sighting in the county in 37 years.

There were nine species of heron and ibis reported. Cattle Egret and Yellow-crowned Night-Heron have become increasingly hard to find in the county and were not seen in 2013. Both American Bittern and Least Bittern were reported as was Glossy Ibis.

All the expected raptor species were seen with the exception of Northern Goshawk, which was seen once in the last four years, after being seen yearly for 33 years.

Sandhill Cranes were seen for the tenth year in a row.

Shorebird numbers for 2013 were at a 30-year low with just 23 species reported. This is seven species less than the 10-year average of 30 species. There were many notable misses. Buff-breasted Sandpiper ended a 15-year run, Ruddy Turnstone's streak ended at 25, and Stilt Sandpiper was missed for the first time in 29 years. Notably, Red Phalarope was seen, while the more likely Wilson's and Red-necked Phalaropes were not. A single Willet was reported on the Conejohela Flats in early July.

There were 13 species of gulls and terns seen. A single Black Tern kept the streak of sightings of that species alive at 25 years.

All eight species of owls normally seen were reported. Notable this year was the irruption of Snowy Owls. There were hundreds of these owls seen throughout the northeast, and Lancaster County played host to many as well. The Amish farmland around the Leola and New Holland area was particularly favored by the owls. This fact made it the ideal relocation area for an owl that was trapped for removal from the Philadelphia International Airport for its safety. The owl was found to be in very good condition and he was recruited for Project SNOWstorm, a project designed to track the movement of owls fitted with solar-powered transmitters utilizing the cellular phone network for downloading information. The owl was nicknamed "Amishtown" for the road near where he was released. He liked the area and remained there for over a month. On the evening of March 18, he finally departed. Sixteen hours later, he was near Coudersport, and in less than a week, he was on the shores of Lake Ontario. The last time his transmitter relayed his location, he was at the northern tip of Lake Huron near Badgeley Island. If he moves into an area with cellular phone coverage again, his transmitter will report where he has traveled, even if it is years later. It will be interesting to see where Amishtown and the other transmitter-tagged owls have traveled in the months and years to come.

Warbler species stood at 34 with just Golden-winged Warbler and Connecticut Warbler missing from the list of expected sightings.

While all expected sparrows were seen this year, Nelson's Sparrow was notable for the numbers tallied both in the county and around the state.

The bird of the year for 2013 is, without a doubt, the Bahama Woodstar, a non-migratory hummingbird species native to the Bahamas and an extremely rare vagrant to southern Florida. This was just the sixth sighting of the species in the United States, and the first sighting outside of southern Florida. In late April, this ABA code 5 bird showed up in Denver, PA, and stayed 5 days. It originally was thought to be a Broad-tailed Hummingbird or some type of hybrid. It was successfully banded and eventually was identified as a Bahama Woodstar. Unfortunately the bird didn't hang around long after word got out about what it was, and it left the area a few hours after it was identified. But, for those folks lucky enough to see it, this was almost certainly a once-in-a-lifetime event.
