## **PREVIEW OF COMING EVENTS**

### **Thursday, April 10, 2025, 7 p.m. - 8:30 p.m. - Monthly Club Meeting – “Bird Migration in Lancaster and Beyond”**

Location: Middle Creek WMA Visitor Center, 100 Museum Road, Stevens, PA

Presented by Shelly Eshleman, MS, Willistown Conservation Trust

This program will focus on bird migration research using the Motus Wildlife Tracking System. You will learn about the birds that have been detected by the Middle Creek receiving station and the pathways that those birds have taken. We will also discuss the role that private landowners can play in helping local birds thrive.

Shelly Eshleman is the Motus Avian Research Coordinator at Willistown Conservation Trust and a PhD student at the University of Delaware. Her research follows birds throughout the year to better understand their movement patterns. As someone who grew up in Lancaster County, she is particularly passionate about conserving Pennsylvania's birds.

Location: Safe Harbor Park Tennis Courts (meetup location), 5365 River Rd., Conestoga, PA

Kim Morelock will lead a field trip to Safe Harbor Park in search of the Yellow-throated Warbler and other early spring migrants. Meet at the Safe Harbor Park tennis court by 7 a.m. Much of the time will be spent walking through the park along the Conestoga River and Warehouse Road. The trip will end by scoping the Susquehanna River below the dam from the platform viewing area. **Monday, April 14, 2025, 7 a.m. – 11 a.m. – Shenk’s Ferry Wildflower Preserve Field Trip**

Location: Safe Harbor Park Tennis Courts (meetup location), 5365 River Rd., Conestoga, PA

Warren and Nina Wolf will lead a field trip to Shenk’s Ferry Wildflower Preserve to observe birds and the wide selection of wildflowers, including Trillium, Virginia Bluebells, and Dutchman’s Britches. Participants will meet at the Safe Harbor Park Tennis Courts at 7 a.m. After a short period of birding at Safe Harbor Park we will head to Shenk’s Ferry. Trip limited to 15 participants. Wear sturdy walking shoes and bring binoculars. This trail will be mostly level and well-groomed. The walk is anticipated to last 3 to 4 hours. Carl Groff will lead a field trip at Safe Harbor Park and Chestnut Grove Natural Area. Meet at 8 a.m. at the Safe Harbor Park tennis courts. In Safe Harbor and Chestnut Grove, the focus will be on different habitats and "hot spots" within those areas. Some target birds include Yellow-throated Warbler, Palm Warbler, White-eyed Vireo, and Fox Sparrow. Walking will be mostly level and dry. Bring water and snacks. Location: Chickies Rock Breezy View Overlook (meeting location), 770 Breezyview Dr., Columbia, PA

Roger Stoner will lead a field trip to Chickies Rock County Park. Meet at 7 a.m. at Breezy View Overlook along Rt. 441 just north of Columbia. After birding Breezy View, which includes a view of a Bald Eagle's nest on the York County side of the Susquehanna River, the group will proceed to the Chickies Rock Overlook parking lot and bird in the park on both sides of Rt. 441. The field trip will end in the day-use area of the park. In addition to warblers, target species include orioles, tanagers, and flycatchers. Be prepared for ticks and bring water and snacks/lunch. Location: Middle Creek WMA Visitor Center, 100 Museum Road, Stevens, PA

Doug Anderson will lead a field trip looking for spring migrants and resident species in the various habitats at Middle Creek. Good weather and good bird activity may lead to walking 2-3 miles on trails with some hills and tall grass. Hiking boots recommended, bring a hat, sunscreen, water, and snacks/lunch and be prepared for ticks. The trip could last into the afternoon. Meet at the visitor center parking lot at 7 a.m. The visitor center does not open until 8 a.m. but there is a porta-john nearby. Carl Groff will lead the Pumping Station Road warbler walk. Meet at 8 a.m. at the parking lot at Rt. 322 and Pumping Station Road. The morning will be spent looking for migrants and resident birds along this popular stretch of Hammer Creek. A wide variety of birds are possible with special attention paid to the warblers that use this area as their home or a brief stopover during migration. Some other target birds will include thrushes, flycatchers, tanagers, orioles and grosbeaks. This trip will last until around noontime so dress for the weather. Presented by: Mandy Talpas, Hawaii Bird Tours. Hawaii is tragically known as the endangered species capital of the world and the archipelago is home to approximately one third of all endangered species in the United States. We will introduce you to Hawaii's rare endemic birds, from petrels to honeycreepers, share the threats they face, and highlight the conservation initiatives in place to help save them from the brink of extinction.

As a Pennsylvania native, and a tremendous lover of birds and wildlife, Mandy Talpas has dedicated her life to avian conservation. She's worked as a Naturalist, a Conservation Educator at an AZA-accredited zoo, Hawk Mountain Sanctuary, and a Bird Banding and Education Specialist at the Smithsonian Migratory Bird Center. She continued to broaden her studies with the Ornithology Lab at Villanova University, as well as studying tropical ecology throughout Latin America.

She is now Hawaii's premier nature and bird guide with her very own birding tour company, Hawaii Bird Tours.

Location: Middle Creek WMA Visitor Center, 100 Museum Road, Stevens, PA

Presented by: Mercy Melo, Pennsylvania Game Commission. Migratory birds don't obey state and international borders, and neither should our studies of them! Research projects that span large geographic areas are key to truly understanding bird populations and how we can protect them best. In this talk, Mercy Melo from the Pennsylvania Game Commission will discuss how teamwork makes the dream work in conservation studies using examples from her research on American Kestrels.

Mercy Melo is a Wildlife Management Supervisor with the Pennsylvania Game Commission with a background in raptor biology and ecology. She got her start in raptor research through her undergraduate work with American Kestrels at Cedar Crest College and continued following this passion throughout her graduate career. She completed her PhD at the University of Massachusetts-Amherst last year where she was able to research potential causes of the population decline in American Kestrels, with the goal of developing management strategies for the species.

Club Meeting presented by Jon Kauffman, PSU's Shavers Creek Environmental Center. Jon will present an in-depth look at the breeding phenology of American Kestrels and Barn Owls through live nest-cam footage. Footage will include activities within the box before egg laying begins, parental role in incubation and brooding, and clues to help nestbox managers to better understand the needs of parents and nestlings to successfully fledge.

Jon promotes conservation through citizen science projects such as Project NestWatch and the American Kestrel and Barn Owl nestbox program at Shaver's Creek Environmental Center. He has served as a hawk-watcher for Tussey Mountain Hawk Watch and has also traveled and worked with other organizations such as Cape May Bird Observatory and Intermountain Bird Observatory in Idaho.

### **Winter Birding Southern California by Mary St John**

One way to take relief from winter in PA is a birding tour of San Diego and Imperial Counties in Southern California. Mary St John joined a Victor Emanuel Tour of the area in mid-January. This short tour (5 days) covers everything from the coast to the Salton Sea and back. Starting at the San Elijo Lagoon Reserve we were able to see some of the California specialties the first day. These included: Allen's Hummingbird, California's Scrub Jay, Thrasher, Gnatcatcher and Towhee. At Pt. La Jolla we saw Black Turnstone, Heermann's Gull and a colony of nesting Brandt's Cormorants. While at Mission Beach, 74 Snowy Plovers snuggled down in the sand. Visiting a parrot roost at sunset, we had both Red-crowned and Lilac-crowned Parrots, my life bird of the trip.

Moving on into the mountains and toward Imperial County, stops at Alpine and Lake Cuyamaca added Spotted Towhee and Tricolored Blackbirds. Anza Borrego Desert S.P. hosted a sleepy Long-eared Owl, while Cattle Call Park had a friendly Vermillion Flycatcher, Verdin and Black-tailed Gnatcatcher. Several sites at the Sonny Bono Salton Sea NWR added Abert's Towhee and Ridgway Rail to our list.

Our return trip took a northern route stopping at Borrego Springs and Ocotillo Wells to look for Bell's and Sagebrush Sparrows (a split of the Sage Sparrow) and Prairie Falcon. A final stop at Ramona Grasslands Reserve gave us good looks at Ferruginous Hawk, Western Meadowlark and Mountain and Western Bluebirds. In the five days, we spent two and a half days in each county and visited 43 e-bird locations tallying 184 species.

## **LANCASTER COUNTY BIRD OBSERVATIONS – Fall 2024**

This fall season 248 species were recorded, just above the 5-year average of 244 (244, 245, 239, 255, 239 previous). The first MacGillivray's Warbler, second Anhinga, and second and third Cave Swallows were especially notable. My unofficial all-time county list would have increased to 366, but since all redpolls were lumped this year into a single species named "Redpoll," it remains at 365. Weather-wise, August and September brought temps and rainfall that were exceptionally average. October, however,

held warm and only brought half an inch of rain. November was also exceptionally warm, with multiple high temperature records exceeding 80F set in its first week. As a whole, the season saw about 60% of its normal rainfall. Weather information is sourced from the NWS Harrisburg station, and the “normal period” is 1991-2020.

A **Greater White-fronted Goose** arrived at WEP 11/24, where it has wintered (SSt, m.ob.). The summering **Trumpeter Swan** at SRCF was captured for rehabilitation 9/22, however, a severe *Aspergillus* fungus infection sadly forced the bird to be euthanized. Fortunately, sightings of this magnificent, formerly breeding bird are still on the rise, and hopefully our wait is short before they once again breed in the county. Three **Surf Scoters** floated around SRCF 10/26 (ME), who also found four Long-tailed Ducks there on 11/24. The Motus tower at MCWMA logged migrating **Eastern Whip-poor-wills** 9/21 and 9/30.

An impressive 27 shorebird species were documented. MCWMA was very low due to the scarce rain, and pulled in 23 of these. **American Avocets** were seen frequently at SRCF, with four observations of a total of eight birds from 8/10-9/1 (WB, ME, TG, SSc, EW). Two **Upland Sandpipers** continued at Lancaster Airport through 8/4 (m.ob.). A **Marbled Godwit** drew a crowd at MCWMA 8/15-20 (BM, m.ob.), and a **Long-billed Dowitcher** made MCMWA its home, residing from 10/2-11/16 (NW, WW, m.ob.) over a remarkable six and half weeks. A **Wilson's Phalarope** lighted briefly at SRCF 8/19 (ML, AMk). A **Willet**, which are less than annual, was found for the third time this year at SRCF 8/9 in the remnants of hurricane Debby (ME, TG, ML, TN, EW). **Ruddy Turnstones** were spotted at MCWMA and SRCF in August. **Baird's Sandpiper** were difficult, with a few sightings between MCWMA and Conewago Recreation Trail & Wetlands 8/22 and 8/27 (BC, ME, JHe, TN). Two **Western Sandpipers** were at SRCF 8/18 (SSc), and one at MCWMA 8/31 (JK).

**Laughing Gulls** wandered up the Susquehanna R, with a notable flock of 13 on 8/9 in Debby's remnants (DS). Two **Black Terns** were spotted on the same day, out of only three total. Congregations on SRLC have not been found for several years. A high count of 10 **Common Terns** were on SRCF 10/1 (JHo). **Red-throated Loons** sometimes avoid detection in fall, but one hung around SRCF 11/19-30 (ML, m.ob.).

A birder in the right place at the right time observed an Anhinga soaring over SRCF 8/3 (ME)! This was the second county record, following the first just last year at the same location. It too was seen and photographed by only one person. Perhaps one will choose to actually spend some time in the county soon.

The wader season sparkled. **White Ibis** descended on Lancaster August-September, with two at SRCF and at least 6 at MCWMA, perhaps young vagrants from the burgeoning colonies of coastal New Jersey (m.ob.). **Glossy Ibis** showed up singly at the same places, with a late record on 10/3 at CGNA (ML). **Least Bittern** was reported twice: At MCWMA 8/3 (PC), and Susquehannock SP 9/30 (TA). Juvenile **Yellow-crowned Night-Herons** were noted at SRCF and WEP 8/9-11, and multiple **Little Blue Herons** were found at MCWMA, SRCF, and OR August-September per usual. Two juvenile **Tricolored Herons** were at SRCF 8/3-20 (JHo, m.ob.), which have recently become annual. Up to six **Snowy Egrets** were reported around SRCF in August (m.ob.), along with one or two **Western Cattle-Egrets** (ME, m.ob.).

A juvenile **Golden Eagle** was seen soaring at MCWMA several times following 11/3 (TD, DK, DS). Eminent **Olive-sided Flycatchers** were strongly represented from five locations, but the furtive **Yellow-**

**bellied Flycatcher** from just three. Our hardy **Say's Phoebe** returned for its third winter at the Blue Rock wastewater treatment plant 10/27 (ME, TN, m.ob.). It's incredible how far a bird will fly to reach a reliable food source. Instead of enjoying sunny Mexico, it has carved out a unique niche here in our snowy, northern latitude picking bugs from wastewater tank walls. **Philadelphia Vireos** were fairly frequent in September.

**Black-capped Chickadees, Tufted Titmice, and Red-breasted Nuthatches** staged strong irruptions. A calling *Sedge Wren* was sound-recorded at CGNA 10/12 (KC).

This November saw an intense movement of **Cave Swallows** from the Great Lakes to the Atlantic coast, and conditions were ripe for appearances in PA. Birders were aware of the trend, and indeed three were spotted at MCWMA 11/16 for the second county record (AMt, EM, MR). Birders scrambled to the area, finally providing hard photo evidence of this species in Lancaster. Another was photographed from Columbia along the Susquehanna R. 11/29 (DS), where it was "nearly hit by a truck" while foraging.

**Evening Grosbeak** were few this fall, but one was photographed at a Hopeland feeder 11/17 (MP). I also received a secondhand report of several at MCWMA the day before, just across the mountain from the feeder bird. **Purple Finch** and **Pine Siskin** sightings were widespread, but in somewhat low numbers. A **Lapland Longspur** at SRCF 10/20 (EW, TG) was likely a first for this location, an unusual place to find a field-dwelling bird. A flyover **Snow Bunting** at WEP 11/17 (FZ) put another tough fall bird on the list. A **Clay-colored Sparrow** spent November at NDP, first found 10/28 (SM).

**Orange-crowned Warblers** were seen at Muddy Run Recreation Park 10/3 (LB), MCWMA 10/5 (JHe), and NDP 11/6 (DK). **Connecticut Warblers** were found in four locations 9/8-10/5 (m.ob.). Birders seem to hone-in on these skulking migrants with increasing ease, often given away by their distinctive "pwik" calls from thick cover.

The surprise of the season came as a **MacGillivray's Warbler** at NDP 11/26 (DK). This first county record was only the fifth in the state, so birders descended on the area. It was difficult to see well, sticking to cover, but with patience many added it to their respective lists. A deformed or broken upper mandible didn't seem to dampen its spirits, and it was frequently seen for several weeks.

**Mourning Warblers** were seen at Speedwell Forge County Park 9/10 (BC), and MCWMA 9/22 (AW). **Cerulean Warbler** is rarely seen in fall, but one was described at Kelly's Run Nature Preserve 9/4 (CB).

## **LANCASTER COUNTY BIRD OBSERVATIONS – Winter 2025**

This winter 142 species were recorded, above the 5-year average of 135 (134, 130, 141, 133, 138 previous). Continuing first **MacGillivray's Warbler** and **Say's Phoebe** were notable. My unofficial all-time county list holds at 365. Weather-wise, the only thing remarkable about the season was that it was quite normal, which has been unusual the last few years. Temperatures, rain, and snowfall were all close to average, with January deviating a bit low on temperature and high on snowfall. Mid-winter ice covered Middle Creek WMA and Lake Clarke on the Susquehanna, waterfowl staged up the Susquehanna after late Jan, and **Snow Goose** aggregated at Middle Creek WMA in February. Comparatively, last year many birds flew through without stopping, or simply remained north of us, and waterfowl numbers were low. If you wanted to bird a standard winter in southeast PA, this was it. Weather information is sourced from the NWS Harrisburg station, and the “normal period” is 1991-2020.

The timing of **Snow Goose** migration was typical this year, compared with prior warm winters, peaking in the third week of Feb at MCWMA around 100,000 birds. Sadly, an outbreak of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza killed hundreds of Snow Geese and other species, resulting in the closure of much of MCWMA to the public during the peak of this seasonal spectacle. Single **Greater White-fronted Geese** were seen sporadically at WEP and Muddy Run Reservoir 12/15-2/17 (TA, EK, m.ob.), and seven were at MCWMA 2/28 (MJ). Along with **Ross's, Cackling, and Canada Goose**, the standard five geese species were found, with no rare vagrants. A **Trumpeter Swan** spent the entire winter on the lower Susquehanna R. below the Holtwood Dam (TA, m.ob.). Eurasian Wigeon was absent. For seaducks, a **White-winged Scoter** was on SRLC 1/30-2/2 (DS, m.ob.), and two were on the Susquehanna R. across from Riverfront Park 2/26 (AM). **Long-tailed Ducks** were found on a variety of dates between 12/17-2/1 along the lower Susquehanna R.

Two **Virginia Rails** wintered at WEP (DS, m.ob.), and a large flock of 19 **Sandhill Cranes** dropped in to MCWMA 12/7 (JH, m.ob.). By 12/15, only four were left which remained until 2/8 around when MCWMA closed. Down at OR, two were seen 12/12-30 (NW, WW, m.ob.), perhaps a piece of the original flock. Six gull species were located, notably a flock of 34 **Bonaparte's Gulls** 12/2 at SRCF (BO, KS), and a juvenile **Iceland Gull** on SRLC 2/4 (EW). Also on the Susquehanna R., a **Red-necked Grebe** was near Bainbridge 12/2 (LB), and a **Red-throated Loon** near Columbia 1/25 (KS).

An adult **Golden Eagle** was photographed at MCWMA 1/15 (ZS), the only sighting of winter. A few **Short-eared Owls** were seen around MCWMA, which is typical, and one was seen around the LCSWMA landfill 2/28 (ML).

The **Say's Phoebe** survived its third winter at the Blue Rock wastewater treatment plant (m.ob.). Early on it was found to be missing a foot, where the previous winter it had both, but that didn't slow it down one bit. A few **Black-capped Chickadees**, and a scattering of **Red-breasted Nuthatch** were reported around the county. A surprise **Marsh Wren** was described at OR 2/7 (CG). Both **Gray Catbird** and

**Brown Thrasher** were found, which are scarce, but regular. **Purple Finch** and **Pine Siskin** were scattered in low numbers.

**Lapland Longspur** and **Snow Bunting** were found in their usual farmland areas, primarily in Jan. A **Chipping Sparrow** was photographed at a feeder north of Lancaster 1/4 (LT), and one was observed foraging along a road near Conestoga 2/2 (NW, WW). The continuing **Clay-colored Sparrow** at MCWMA was observed through 12/27 (JH, TD), and another was found on CBC near CGNA 12/22 (LB, KL, JM), along with two **Vesper Sparrows**. An adult male **Yellow-headed Blackbird** was picked out of a blackbird flock near Quarryville 2/20 (NW, WW). Also in Quarryville, a **Baltimore Oriole** visited a feeder 12/19 at an Amish residence (NW, WW), which had been seen for several weeks.

Six warbler species were documented. A **Black-and-white-Warbler** was viewed at BRWTP 12/22-26 (JH, AH). The continuing first county **MacGillivray's Warbler** at NDP was last seen 12/17 (m.ob.). **Cape May Warblers** are often on our winter checklist, but this season there were three photographed observations! The first was at a wastewater treatment plant south of Lancaster city 1/22 (AZ), the second at a feeder in Washington Boro 2/8-11 (anon.), and the third at a feeder in Marietta 2/20 (BL). A **"Yellow" Palm Warbler** was found at CGNA 12/27 (MM). There were four **Pine Warblers** about the county throughout the winter, primarily at feeders (PF, SS, anon.). **Yellow-rumped Warblers** were frequent, with a maximum of 14 at BRWTP 2/4 (EW).

## **REVIEW OF COMPLETED EVENTS**

**October 12, 2024 - Chestnut Grove Beginning Birder Field Trip.** Meredith Lombard led a group of beginning birders with some being "absolute first-timers." Notable species included Peregrine Falcon, American Kestrel and Palm Warbler. The weather was perfect and everyone had a great experience.

**December 22, 2024 – Lancaster Christmas Bird Count.** The Lancaster Christmas Bird Count (CBC) was held on December 22, 2024. Volunteer numbers were lower with 36 volunteers in the field (63 in 2023) and 9 volunteers watching feeders at home (15 in 2023). A total of 90 species was identified in 2024 compared to 85 for 2023 and 80 for 2022.

The Say's Phoebe returned to the water treatment plant in Manor Township for the third year in a row and was present for the count. Another rare species for 2024 was a Clay-colored Sparrow identified by Larry Bernhardt. Waterfowl numbers were up slightly with 17 species of ducks and geese. Waterfowl highlights included 1 Cackling Goose, 13 Common Goldeneye, 1 Common Loon and 1 Horned Grebe.

Other highlights included 1 red-breasted Nuthatch, 1 Black-and-white Warbler, 8 American Pipits, 12 species of sparrows including 1 Vesper Sparrow and 2 Savannah Sparrows. Falcons were only represented by the American Kestrel with 8 birds counted. The only owls seen this year were 5 Eastern Screech-Owls and 4 Great Horned Owls.

The temperatures ranged from 15 degrees in the early morning to 30 degrees mid-afternoon with one inch of snow on the ground. Many thanks to the volunteers for coming out on a cold day to help make another successful Christmas Bird Count. Hope to see you next year and bring some birder friends.

**January 18, 2025 – Riverfront Park Field Trip.** Emily Broich led 12 participants for winter birding at East Donegal Riverfront Park on January 18th. The group didn't have much luck with winter waterfowl but observed 29 total species. Highlights included a flock of 10 Wild Turkey roosting across the river, good looks at five species of woodpeckers, both species of kinglets, and Winter Wren. A few life birds for some of the participants were celebrated along the way!

**January 25, 2025 – Safe Harbor Dam/Observation Road Beginning Birder Field Trip.** Wicked cold, 8°F to start the morning at Safe Harbor Dam. Twelve people were in attendance with Sarah Gotwols leading. We shifted from Safe Harbor Dam observation deck to the barn at Climbers Run for attendee safety with the frigid temperature where attendees could view the birds in the meadow and on the feeder cam station. Notable species included several Bald Eagles at the Safe Harbor Dam and the Pileated Woodpeckers at Climbers Run.

**February 8, 2025 – River Watch Birding Event.** The club's second annual River Watch Birding Event took place at Columbia Crossing River Trails Center in Columbia led by Club President Ted Nichols. Despite an icy forecast predicted later in the day, club members showed up in force with plenty of scopes to allow over 30 people who stopped by to scope out the bird life on the river with us! Twenty-two species were observed during the three-hour event.

Highlights included more than 40 very active Buffleheads that seemed to always be providing views, 20 Lesser Scaup, a dozen Common Goldeneye, more than 750 Ring-billed Gulls, a half dozen Herring Gulls and a lone Great Black-backed Gull. Mergansers were well represented with 28 Common, 2 Hooded and one Red-breasted. A single Pied-billed Grebe also provided nice views. **February 22, 2025 – Middle Creek WMA Field Trip.** Craig Boyhont had one participant for this modified trip to Middle Creek. Instead of the waterfowl focus, we were limited to the conservation trail and visitor's center due to the closures for the HPAI. The cold snap in the days ahead of this walk had frozen all the ponds and water within roadside viewing. We did get a view of a liftoff of about 3000 snow geese visible to the north. The bird list for the morning totaled 20 species. The most unusual sighting was not a bird, but a skunk foraging at the visitor center feeders in the middle of the morning.

**March 1, 2025 – Middle Creek WMA Beginning Birder Field Trip.** Sarah Gotwols led 15 participants for the second beginner birder event of the year despite high winds. Road closures were in place due to the avian influenza as well. Snow Geese and Tundra Swans were visible on the lake while White-crowned Sparrows were in abundance at the feeders outside the observation area. On the small pond new birders enjoyed watching a pair of Northern Shovelers as well. A Pileated Woodpecker made a showy drive-by at the feeders for a brief up-close encounter.

**March 8, 2025 – Middle Creek WMA Field Trip.** My trip to Middle Creek to view the Woodcock and Short-eared Owls went very well this year. We were pleasantly surprised at the reopening of the refuge after the avian flu closure just the day before the trip. There were 15 people on the trip including several children. The timing of sunset led to an awesome Woodcock display flight with the waning sunset glow as a background. We were able to see at least 8 Woodcock display flights and we heard (well the Merlin app heard) one Short-eared Owl but it was too dark to find. Everyone was pleased with the trip and the weather cooperated with warmer than usual temperatures and the 30 mph winds died down to a 10 mph breeze. This trip was led by John Lahr.

**March 15, 2025 – Susquehanna River Field Trip.** A group of twenty participants took part in this trip along the Susquehanna River led by Derek Stoner. We viewed the birds from the launch at John Wright Restaurant, the Lemon Street access and Blue Rock Boat Launch.

Highlights among the 41 total species included good comparison looks at all three merganser species, lots of Bonaparte's Gulls feeding on emerging stoneflies, close views of Killdeer, recently-arrived Wood Ducks, large numbers of Green-winged Teal, courting Northern Pintails, and a Bald Eagle on a nest.

## **LANCASTER COUNTY YEAR LIST BY MIKE EPLER**

During 2024, birders in Lancaster County reported locating 271 different bird species.

One new species was added to the official list of Lancaster County birds. The addition of MacGillivray's Warbler brings the total to 363. \*

There were 33 species of waterfowl reported including all the expected species. Among the less common species located were Black-bellied Whistling-Duck, Brant, Trumpeter Swan, Eurasian Wigeon, and Surf Scoter. Black-bellied Whistling-Duck has become more common, having been reported in five of the last 12 years. The sighting of Eurasian Wigeon was the first in five years. Prior to this they had been seen for 11 years running.

Among game birds Wild Turkey and Ring-necked Pheasant were found. Ruffed Grouse was not reported. It has only been found in the county during three of the past 15 years. Prior to that it was an annual occurrence.

Ruby-throated Hummingbird was the only hummingbird species reported.

Both Virginia Rail and Sora continue to be seen yearly.

Sandhill Crane has been spotted for 21 years in a row. Prior to 2004 they were seen an average of once every three years.

The shorebird species count for the year was 27, down one from last year and right at the 10-year average. Among the less common species reported were American Avocet, Upland Sandpiper, Marbled Godwit, Long-billed Dowitcher, Wilson's Phalarope, and Ruddy Turnstone.

There were 12 species of gulls and terns seen. The less common among these were Black-headed Gull, Laughing Gull, Franklin's Gull, and Lesser Black-backed Gull. Little Gull was missed for the first time in 30 years. All the usual tern species were reported including Black Tern and Common Tern.

Pied-billed Grebe and Horned Grebe were seen. The less frequent Red-necked Grebe was also reported.

Common Loon and the less common Red-throated Loon were both sighted.

An Anhinga was found for the second year in a row at the Conejohela Flats. The one sighted there last year was the first county record.

There were 13 species of wading birds seen. Among the less common species were White Ibis, Glossy Ibis, Least Bittern, Little Blue Heron, Tricolored Heron, and Western Cattle Egret.

All the expected raptor species were observed along with a Mississippi Kite. American Goshawk was missed for the thirteenth year in a row after being seen for 34 of the previous 35 years.

All seven of the normally occurring species of owls were seen. There was also a Snowy Owl photographed in the city of Lancaster.

All the usual flycatchers were reported. Additionally, a Scissor-tailed Flycatcher was found in the county. This was the first sighting since 1942. The Say's Phoebe discovered during the 2022 Christmas Bird Count returned for a third winter.

Common Raven has been seen for the past 23 years in a row. They had been reported in just nine of the previous 25 years. They now have been confirmed to be breeding in the county.

Along with all of the common swallow species there were several sightings of Cave Swallows around the county. At Middle Creek WMA three individuals lingered for two days, allowing many people the opportunity to see them.

All expected wren species were reported including Marsh Wren. A Sedge Wren was also seen.

All the usual sparrows were seen this year. Nelson's Sparrow was missed for the fourth year.

The warbler species count was 35 with all expected species seen. The less common Connecticut Warbler, Golden-winged Warbler, and Orange-crowned Warbler were all reported as well as a first county record MacGillivray's Warbler.

The choice of the bird of the year for 2024 is relatively easy, MacGillivray's Warbler. The bird was a first county record, and just the fourth state record for the species. It remained for three weeks giving those wishing to see it ample time. It was not always the most cooperative bird. It was wide ranging and spent much of its time in heavy cover, but with enough perseverance it offered some truly stunning views.
