Harold B. Morrin Scholarship Applications Now Being Accepted for Funding in 2026

LCBC is pleased to offer \$1,000 scholarships to youth and adults annually to help provide financial support for educational camps, field courses, research, conservation, and educational

interpretation projects which promote or develop an interest in natural history and the environment, with a preference given to the field of ornithology.

The primary deadline to apply for funds from the Harold B. Morrin Scholarship is December 31 of each year. Decisions will be made within 30 days of the application deadline. If budgeted funds for the year are not fully dispersed through this process, the Scholarship Committee will consider applications received beyond that date on a first-come, first-serve basis. Out-of-cycle applications for remaining funds must still be endorsed by the LCBC Scholarship Committee and will also be referred to the LCBC Board of Directors for final approval.

Last Call: Annual Members-Only Trip to Chincoteague and the Eastern Shore

The Lancaster County Bird Club’s annual members-only trip to Chincoteague and the Eastern Shore is scheduled for October 24–27 this year. Led by Club President Ted Nichols, the trip offers two full days of birding in the Chincoteague area, with the option to stay Sunday night for extended exploration or return home that day for a shorter stay.

Highlights include two full days of birding around the Chincoteague area, with a pontoon boat excursion on top of that, as well as stops at Eastern Neck and Blackwater National Wildlife Refuges on the way down and birding at locations like Bombay Hook NWR on the return trip.

For anyone wishing to be closer to the Friday morning starting point, a group rate is available for Thursday night at a local hotel near Eastern Neck in Chestertown, Maryland, at \$127 (plus taxes).

As part of our limited hotel block, rooms in Chincoteague are available at a rate of \$132 per night (plus taxes) for two adults, including a light continental breakfast. The pontoon boat excursion will cost approximately \$40 per person paid directly to Ted.

A few spaces remain since the early August announcement of the trip. To secure your spot, you must reach out to Ted no later than September 21 by emailing tanicholsii@gmail.com or texting 717-856-3851. Once confirmed, Ted will provide instructions to reserve your hotel — please do not contact the hotel directly until you receive confirmation from him.

PREVIEW OF COMING EVENTS

Thursday, September 11, 2025, 7 p.m. – 8:30 p.m. – Monthly Club Meeting – “Talkin’ Turkey – Wild Turkey Projects in Pennsylvania”

Location: North Museum of Nature and Science, 400 College Ave, Lancaster, PA 17603

Presented by Rachel Pennell, Wild Turkey Research Project Crew Leader, PA Game Commission Southeast Region

Eastern Wild Turkeys (*Meleagris gallopavo silvestris*) are being intensely studied in Pennsylvania. We will discuss the objectives of the hen and gobbler projects initiated by the PA Game Commission. Interactions of habitat, predators, hunter harvest, disease, and weather are being investigated. The findings will provide insight on how to better manage turkey populations region wide.

Rachel Pennell is the Wild Turkey Research Project Crew Leader for the Southeast Region of the PA Game Commission. Prior to coming to the PA Game Commission, she worked with migratory waterfowl for Winous Point Marsh Conservancy and the Cohen Wildlife Lab at Tennessee Technological University.

Location: Ironville Community Park, 711-725 Prospect Rd, Columbia PA 17512

Carl Groff will lead the count at a hawk watch that will take place in the Ironville Community Park parking lot off Prospect Road starting at 9:30 a.m. The viewing area is level and comfortable. Bring chairs and a lunch. The site has public restrooms and a pavilion. Target species will include Broad-winged Hawk, American Kestrel, Osprey, Bald Eagle and Sharp-shinned Hawk. The watch will continue until the flight ends. Feel free to come and go as you wish. Binoculars are needed and a spotting scope is helpful. Sunday, September 21, 2025, 8 a.m. – 11:30 a.m. - Pumping Station Road Field Trip

Meeting Location: Horseshoe Trail Parking Lot at Pumping Station Road and Route 322, State Game Lands (SGL) #156, Lititz, PA (outside Brickerville)

Carl Groff will lead a field trip to Pumping Station Road outside Brickerville. Meet at 8 a.m. at the gravel parking lot at the intersection of Route 322 and Pumping Station Road. Located in the Furnace Hills in northern Lancaster County, Pumping Station Road works its way along the Hammer Creek through SGL 156. Pumping Station Road is one of the more popular spots for warblers and fall migrants in Lancaster County. This section will take you along a gravel/stone road through mixed wooded areas along the creek and in one section you will go through a clearcut area for power lines. A wide variety of birds are possible with special attention made to the warblers that use this area as a brief stop-over during migration. Some other target birds will include thrushes, flycatchers, tanagers, orioles, sparrows, grosbeaks, and hopefully a surprise or two along the way. There are no restroom facilities or porta-johns at this location. Closest restroom facilities would be in Brickerville at one of the gas stations at the main intersection with Rt. 501. Cell phone reception is also poor at this location. Regular hiking shoes/boots will be fine for this trip as much of the walking will be on mostly level gravel/grass covered roads. Thursday, October 9, 2025, 7 p.m. – 8:30 p.m. - Monthly Club Meeting – “Returning Northern Bobwhite Quail to Pennsylvania”

Location: North Museum of Nature and Science, 400 College Ave, Lancaster, PA 17603

Presented by Haley Keff, Quail, Pheasant and Dove Biologist with the Pennsylvania Game Commission

After decades of habitat loss, wild populations of northern bobwhite were officially extirpated from Pennsylvania in 2014. Ten years later, significant progress has been made toward reestablishing quail through translocation efforts. This presentation will discuss the species' decline, the status of the restoration project, and highlight how, in collaboration with our dedicated partners, we are working to restore wild quail to the commonwealth.

Haley Keff recently completed her master's at Texas Tech University, where her research focused on bobwhite management including translocation, habitat selection, and chick survival. She is now the Quail, Pheasant, and Dove Biologist with the Pennsylvania Game Commission leading the state's bobwhite quail reintroduction program.

Saturday, October 11, 2025, 6 a.m. – 5:30 p.m. - BIG SIT at Middle Creek Wildlife Management Area (Rain Date Oct 12)

Location: Middle Creek Wildlife Management Area Visitor Center, 100 Museum Road, Stevens, PA 17578

Bruce Carl will conduct a “Big Sit” at Middle Creek WMA up the hill on the Conservation Trail overlooking the visitor center on Oct. 11 (rain date Oct. 12). He will start before dawn and go into the evening. The public may stop by at any time to assist him with identifying species seen and heard from his 17-foot circle or just stop by to visit. The Big Sit is an annual, international, noncompetitive birding event founded by the New Haven (Connecticut) Bird Club. The LCBC is using this event as a fundraiser to supplement our annual donations to Middle Creek WMA and the LCBC youth scholarship program. Meeting Location: Old Trolley Line Park, 475 Beverly Rd., Elizabethtown, PA 17022

Carl Groff will lead this easy walking field trip west along the trail with a stop at the Hershey Trust Wetlands overlook, and then continue west with views of open fields, woodland, and creeks. The walk will be out and back, probably a distance of 2-3 miles, depending on the wishes of the group. You may turn around at any time to go back to the parking lot. Note: You can no longer park along Rt. 743. From Lancaster take Rt. 283 west to the Elizabethtown Rt. 743 exit. Turn right onto Rt. 743 towards Hershey. Go about 1/4 mile and turn right on Beverly Road. A parking area for the Conewago Trail is on the left side of the road at Old Trolley Line Park. There is a porta-john in the parking lot. Presented by Matthew Young, co-lead on the Evening Grosbeak Road to Recovery Project and Founder and Board President of the Finch Research Network and co-author of “The Stokes Guide to Finches of the United States and Canada”

From backyards to wilderness peaks, finches are some of the most exciting, mysterious, and popular group of songbirds. In this information-packed book, Lillian Stokes, best-selling author of 35 Stokes guides, and finch expert Matthew Young will introduce you to the 43 finches of the United States and Canada from feeder-favorite goldfinches to Red Crossbill tribes, to least known mountain-top Black Rosy-Finches to endangered Hawaiian honeycreepers. *The Stokes Guide to Finches of the United States and Canada* will also be profiled and was recently published. It covers detailed finch identification, language, behavior, irruptions, specialized maps and foraging charts on crossbills, how to conserve finches and much more. Infused throughout with quotes from the creative Quick Take chapter intros, filled with interesting facts, scientific knowledge, and stunning photos, this book will leave you understanding so much more about the finches you thought you knew.

Matthew Young is a co-lead on the Evening Grosbeak Road to Recovery Project in addition to being the Founder and Board President of the Finch Research Network. Matthew worked in the field of social work with special needs populations at the William George Agency for 12+ years and is currently a Wild Bird Products Specialist and Conservation Coordinator for Aspen Song Wild Bird Food. Additionally, Matthew worked at the Cornell Lab for 15 years where he worked on Golden-winged Warblers, Voices of Hawaii’s Birds, Merlin Bird ID, and was Project Lead on the Lab’s first Irruption Finch Survey in 1999. Widely known as a preeminent authority on finches of North America, he has written finch species accounts for breeding bird atlases, Birds of the World accounts, and published several papers on finches and the Red Crossbill vocal complex.

Wednesday, December 10, 2025, 6:30 p.m. – 8 p.m. - Special Program: It's the most wonderful time of the year — Christmas Bird Count Season!

Location: Middle Creek Wildlife Management Area Visitor Center, 100 Museum Road, Stevens, PA 17578

Join Ted Nichols, president of the LCBC, to explore the fascinating history of the Christmas Bird Count (CBC), the world's longest-running citizen science survey, which began in 1900 as a new tradition to replace Christmas "side hunts," where participants competed to see how many birds they could kill. This year marks the 126th CBC, and the Lititz Christmas Bird Count—covering Middle Creek and the surrounding area—is one of the oldest in the nation, dating back to 1905, even before Middle Creek existed. Discover how this cherished event brings bird enthusiasts together to celebrate conservation and community. Learn about the CBC's origins, its influence on birding in Lancaster County and beyond, and how bird occurrences in this area have evolved dramatically since the first count was conducted. This special lecture will be held inside the visitor center at Middle Creek! Note: *A field trip will complement this lecture and be held on Dec. 27 at 10:30 a.m. Meet at the visitor center, check out our events calendar entry for full details on that offering!*

Speaker Bio: Ted Nichols II has been the compiler for the Lititz Christmas Bird Count since 2017 and, since 2022, president of the Lancaster County Bird Club, a local 400+ member nonprofit organization promoting birding and conservation. A public affairs professional with nearly 20 years of federal government experience, he currently works as a civilian at Naval Supply Systems Command in Mechanicsburg and recently retired from the military after 20 years in the U.S. Air Force and Pennsylvania Air National Guard. Ted also previously led the Astronomical Society of Harrisburg and founded the Cherry Springs Star Party back in 2004.

Presented by Dr. Jeff Larkin and his graduate students Colin Lynch and Nick Logan

Dr. Jeff Larkin, biology professor at Indiana University of Pennsylvania and American Bird Conservancy Forest Bird Advisor, will introduce two of his graduate students who will report on their master's level research on ovenbirds and whip-poor-wills. The research findings they will share are part of a long-term ongoing effort to better understand the factors that affect the occupancy and abundance of at-risk species and diverse eastern forest bird communities in

general. Colin Lynch is studying the effects of forest structure on ovenbird abundance using LiDAR data. Nick Logan is using autonomous recording units and a machine learned classifier to studying the relationship between whip-poor-will abundance and time since prescribed fire.

Remembering Ad Crable

The birds — and outdoors — have lost a friend in conservation. We are saddened by news of the recent loss of Ad Crable — a 42+ year journalist and fellow LCBC member — at the age of 72 on Aug. 28, 2025. "Quarterly Compiler for Lancaster County Bird Observations Needed for Pennsylvania Society for Ornithology and Pennsylvania Birds Journal — Reports also printed in LCBC Newsletter"

REVIEW OF COMPLETED EVENTS

April 12, 2025 – Safe Harbor Park Field Trip. Kim Morelock ran this field trip. We had a light rain the entire morning but managed to get 50 species!! I had seven people with me. Highlights were a good number of Yellow-throated Warblers, Hermit Thrush, Pileated Woodpecker and Blue-gray Gnatcatcher.

April 14, 2025 – Shenk’s Ferry. A group of 12, led by Nina and Warren Wolf, met first at Conestoga River Park in cool 43 degrees and misty rain. We typically start here in hopes of finding the striking Yellow-throated Warblers and they did not disappoint as we saw two of these early warblers. We also were treated to several Yellow-rumped and Palm Warblers as well as one Pine Warbler. We had both Golden-crowned and Ruby-crowned Kinglets. A special treat was three Yellow-bellied Sapsuckers, two seen together, while we were just getting started in the parking area. We totaled 42 species before leaving the park and getting to Shenk’s Ferry by about 9 a.m. where the weather had improved with sun and temps in the 50s. Wildflowers like the Bluebells the park is known for were in their prime. Showy Orchis leaves were up but not yet in bloom and one “Stinking Benjamin,” nearing bloom, was still stunning. Twenty-four species were observed on this walk; we heard two distinct Louisiana Waterthrushes but only Nelson Yoder was lucky enough to get a good look at one.

April 19, 2025 – Safe Harbor and Chestnut Grove. Carl Groff led 11 participants on this field trip, including his father. The weather was sunny and cool in the 60s with light and variable wind. We had a nice morning with a total of 42 species spotted. We got good looks at Yellow-throated Warbler, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher and Yellow-rumped Warbler.

At Chestnut Grove, the group saw a few raptors – Coopers Hawk, American Kestrel, Red-tailed Hawk, Osprey, and Bald Eagle, among other species.

May 3, 2025 – Pumping Station Road Warbler Walk. Carl Groff led 13 participants on this sunny, calm day with temperatures in the low 60s. Warblers were not numerous, but we did see 8 species. Black-and-white Warblers were the most numerous. The most unusual sighting was a Canada Goose way up on top of a dead oak snag, sixty feet up in the air. A total of 47 species were observed.

May 3, 2025 – Chickies Rock County Park Warbler Walk. The leaders of this warbler walk were Derek Stoner, Meredith Lombard and Roger Stoner. There were eight participants including the leaders. The weather was partly cloudy and 70 degrees. This outing started well with a Wild Turkey feeding along the road to the Breezie View parking lot. However, it was a slow day for warblers with only 13 total warblers of seven species seen. Everyone had a long

clear view of a Yellow-billed Cuckoo. Other good birds were a Scarlet Tanager, Swainson's Thrush and Wood Thrushes. A total of 55 species were observed among 449 total birds.

May 3, 2025 – Middle Creek WMA Warbler Walk. Doug Anderson had 10 participants on this warbler walk where 67 total species were observed, this included seven warbler species. The best birds seen were Yellow-breasted Chat and Worm-eating Warbler.

May 4, 2025 – Northwest River Trail. There were only three of us (Nina and Warren Wolf and one participant) for this walk but we toughed it out in damp conditions with more rain coming. We easily found a very, very vocal Prothonotary Warbler and had great looks at it; other warbler species included Black-and-white Warbler, Northern Parula, Yellow Warbler, and Yellow-throated Warbler. We had several Warbling and Red-eyed Vireos, Blue-gray Gnatcatchers and Indigo Buntings as well. Walking back to the cars we had two more Prothonotary Warblers singing around us as well as a Rose-breasted Grosbeak. Over three dozen species for the walk. As we finished up, the expected rain arrived right on queue.

May 10, 2025 – Muddy Run Recreational Park. Larry Bernhardt led a field trip to Muddy Run Recreational Park on May 10. It was attended by seven members from the LCBC on a beautiful morning. We crossed the causeway and climbed up the relatively steep slope to the open field between two tree lines. We traveled 2.8 miles over 3 hours and 10 minutes viewing 44 species which included 8 warblers, with the Wilson Warbler being the least common.

May 10, 2025 – World Migratory Bird Day.

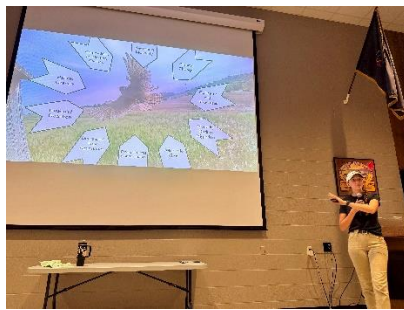
May 11, 2025 – Millport Conservancy. Doug Anderson had eleven participants on this field trip and they observed 43 species.

May 17, 2025 – Susquehannock State Park. Tom Amico and Larry Bernhardt led a field trip to Susquehannock State Park on May 17. There were five attending who met at the Susquehanna River overlook. The morning started out somewhat overcast, but it turned into a nice mildly hot

sunny day. From the overlook, we walked back towards the entrance and through the fields on the return trip. We saw or heard six species of warblers including a Kentucky Warbler. We were thrilled to see an immature Mississippi Kite that was first sighted by Michelle Joyce with Josh Schulz and others in the group confirming its identification. It was soaring high over the open area and was viewed for 20 plus seconds. What a bird to see towards the end of the field trip!

May 18, 2025 – Birding in Juniata County. This trip was cancelled.

June 12, 2025 – Club Meeting.

June 14 – 19, 2025 – Trip to Maine. LCBC returned to Maine for a second year in a row June 14-19, 2025. The trip which filled up 10 minutes after announcing it at our January meeting was once again guided by PA native Seth Benz who served as Senior Bird Engagement Specialist for the Schoodic Institute at Acadia. This year's trip focused on the Big Woods of Maine around Mount Katahdin and Baxter State Park. We also spent one evening on the coast to allow for another Puffin cruise to Petit Mandan. Ten members of the club traveled up together by van for the trip and we were joined by another club member who was in the area for a few days of the trip. 116 species were observed in total on the trip. June 22, 2025 – Ferncliff Preserve & Bald Eagle Road Field Trip. This trip was cancelled due to the trip leader's illness.

June 28, 2025 – Middle Creek's Conservation Collectibles Expo.

July 12, 2025 – Conoy Wetlands and Falmouth Forest Garden. Fifteen attendees walked the Northwest River Trail from Prescott Rd to the Falmouth Forest Garden. Thirty-one species were seen. The highlights included an abundance of Northern Cardinals (40), active Yellow-billed Cuckoo and Great Crested Flycatcher along the trail, with Great Egrets and Double-crested Cormorants out on the river. No Prothonotary Warblers were seen or heard, however Mike Epler reports that there were several active nests at the Conoy Wetlands bird blind this season.

July 17, 2025 – Barn Owl Banding at Middle Creek WMA. Following LCBC's July meeting where Jon Kauffman from Penn State's Shaver's Creek Environmental Center presented a captivating program called "Life in a Nestbox," the Game Commission hosted members from LCBC and Quittapahilla Audubon Society for a special barn owl banding at Middle Creek on July 17. Many thanks to PGC's Dan Mummert and Laura Richmond for working with us to put this special event together.



August 9, 2025 – Clark Nature Preserve. Ten people were present, a few were first time attendees to a bird club event. We walked the Universal Accessible Trail and saw in total forty species during the time on site. Highlights included a family of Red-bellied Woodpeckers that was very active foraging and calling; a Willow Flycatcher, White-eyed Vireo and Baltimore Oriole - all of which were life list birds for a few folks; and a close-up observation of a first year Red-eyed Vireo with a large caterpillar in its beak that perched and was calling for the adult bird only a few feet away for several minutes. We also hiked out Goodno Trail to House Rock Overlook for raptors and other birds soaring over the river. Only a few vultures were seen.
